These activities, which link with the topics being studied in class, can be completed to further extend your child's learning.		A range of these activities must be completed <u>every day</u> to support your child's learning.	
<p>English</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Anglo-Saxon advert - Create a poster to advertise your village's market day? What goods are sold? What language might you use to persuade people? <p>And/or</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Write a diary from the point of view of an Anglo-Saxon child. Describe a day in your life, what you eat, where you live, and what you fear (maybe a Viking raid!). 	4	<p>Reading</p> <p>Pick up your reading book and enjoy immersing yourself in a story. This could be you reading or being read to. Don't forget to write a comment in your reading records. Reading books will be changed Wednesday and Friday, so please bring in your reading books to change on these days.</p>	1
<p>Science-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Recipe Adaptation Investigation - Change one ingredient in a simple recipe (e.g. using honey instead of sugar, or milk alternatives). Predict what will happen, record the results and explain why. Food Preservation Then & Now - Research how the Anglo-Saxons preserved food without fridges. Try drying a slice of apple at home and observe changes over a few 	4	<p>Spellings</p> <p>You will be giving weekly spellings to practice and accompanying sheets. These are in accordance to the national curriculum. Each child will be given weekly spellings on Friday and will be tested on the following Friday. To help practise, you could try writing the words in fancy letters, bubble writing or different colours. You could even try to make the words using different materials. Don't forget to write your words into sentences.</p>	1
<p>Art/Dt</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Design and create your own Anglo-Saxon brooch, shield or helmet using recycled materials, clay, or cardboard. Look up real artefacts for inspiration—try using patterns, symmetry and metallic colours. Bonus: write a museum-style label to explain what your object is and who would have used it. 	4	<p>Times Tables Rockstars</p> <p>Times Tables are very important in Year 4, so we will be competing in a Year Group competition to see which class can win the most points. Keep practicing to earn points for your class. Speak to your teacher if you have forgotten your login.</p>	1
<p>Geography/ History</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Research what makes a good location for a settlement (e.g. near water, good land, defensible). Draw a map of your own Anglo-Saxon village and label the key features: the hall, huts, farmland, river, forest, etc. Think about why the Anglo-Saxons might have chosen this place. 	4		
<p>Local outing</p> <p>Visit Canterbury Cathedral or St Augustine's Abbey—both are linked to the Anglo-Saxon period and the arrival of Christianity in Britain. While there, sketch the buildings, look for Anglo-Saxon features, and imagine what it would have been like to live in that time. Take photos or write a short report on what you discovered</p>	4
